Early college high schools provide more than just college credit; they provide a way up. The 13 early colleges that make up the Ohio Early College Association (OECA) provide each student with an academic roadmap that accelerates them through a rigorous high school course of study, helping students earn transferrable college credits while still in high school, at no additional cost to the students or their families. At many schools, students graduate high school with both a diploma and an associate degree.




Early college graduates are 2.5 times more likely to be prepared for college (38%) than their peers within the Ohio's eight urban school districts (10%)
